March 13, 2013

A Regular Meeting of the Borough Council convened in the Borough Hall at 7:30 p.m. with Mayor Stemberger presiding.

Invocation was given by Mayor Stemberger, followed by the pledge of allegiance.

Mayor Stemberger noted that the requirements of the Open Public Meetings Act have been met by the filing and posting of the Annual Notice.

President Schneider Councilpersons, Nolan, Schalick, Williams and Zee answered to the roll call. Absent – Davis.

Committee reports were made at this time: Streets, Finance, Public Safety, Buildings and Grounds, Solid Waste/Parks and Playgrounds, Water/Street Lights.

Evan Pike presented his Eagle Scout Project of auditing the 911 addresses in the Borough of Elmer. Motion Zee, seconded Nolan approving the project.

Carol Kiniry representing Ford, Scott Associates., the Borough Auditor presented the 2013 Municipal Budget for introduction. The tax rate will be a \$.022 cent increase over 2012 which totals \$.534 per \$100.00 (1 cent = \$10,500.00). (School rate \$.023)

3. Vacation Pay/Policy:

A. Full-time employees:

1-5 years of employment	10 days
6-15 years of employment	15 days
16+ years of employment	20 days

B. There is no requirement that vacation days be taken consecutively.

C. Vacation may be used to cover unpaid sick leave or any unpaid days off, except days as a result of disciplinary action.

D. All vacation is subject to the approval of the employee’s supervisor.

E. No more than one week of vacation may be carried over from one calendar year to the next, and must be used by June 1 of that year.

4. Sick Leave - Full-time Employees:

A. Employees are entitled to five paid sick days, of which five can be carried to the following calendar year up to a maximum of 15 accumulated sick days at any time.

B. Employees will not be reimbursed for carried-over or unused sick time upon the conclusion of their employment.

5. Bereavement Leave - Full-time Employees.

A. The employee shall receive time off with pay from the date of death until subsequent interment for immediate family members, which shall include spouse, child, parent, brother, sister (inclusive of both step and/or half), as well as mother-in-law and father-in-law not to exceed (5) days.

B. The employee shall receive one day with pay for the following family members: brother-in-law, sister-in-law, aunt, uncle, or grandparents.

C. Employees shall only be paid for bereavement days taken if they were actually scheduled to work on those days.

6. Overtime:

A. Overtime must be approved by the appropriate Borough Council Chairperson, except in an emergency.

7. The salaries, wages and compensations set forth herein shall become effective on January 1, 2013.

8. If any section or provision of this Ordinance shall be declared by a Court of competent jurisdiction to be in valid, such decision shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance as a whole or any part thereof.

9. All Ordinances, or parts of Ordinances, heretofore adopted and that are inconsistent with the terms and provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

10. This Ordinance shall be effective upon its final passage, adoption and publication in the manner prescribed by law.

**RESOLUTION SUPPORTING ASSEMBLY BILL A-2753 AND SENAT BILL S-1923 REQUIRING
DIRECT PAYMENT OF ENERGY TAXES TO MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT**

Number 39-13

WHEREAS, taxes on gas and electric utilities were originally collected by the host municipalities, and when the State made itself the collection agent for these taxes, it promised to dedicate the proceeds to municipal property tax relief; and

WHEREAS, just as municipalities collect property taxes for the benefit of school districts, counties and other entities; the State is supposed to collect Energy Taxes for the benefit of municipal governments; and

WHEREAS, for years, though, State officials have diverted funding from Energy Taxes to plug holes in the State budget and to fund State programs; and

WHEREAS, the cumulative impact of years of underfunding has left many municipalities with serious needs and burdensome property taxes; and

WHEREAS, municipalities lost \$331 million in combined Energy Tax and Consolidated Municipal Property Tax Relief Aid (CMPTRA) funding in Fiscal Years 2009, 2010, and 2011, while also being denied scheduled incremental funding; and

WHEREAS, as a result of these cuts, in a number of municipalities property taxes are higher now, despite the fact that they are spending less, proving that the State's diversion of tax relief funding has contributed to higher municipal property taxes; and

WHEREAS, A-2753, sponsored by Assemblymen Daniel Benson and Wayne DeAngelo, and S-1923, sponsored by Senator Linda Greenstein, would restore the \$331 million in municipal property tax relief funding, ensure that each municipality will be restored to the 2007 (SFY 2008) Energy Tax Receipts/CMPTRA level and adjust that amount to account for inflation.; and

WHEREAS, the bills would require certain energy tax receipts to be paid directly to municipalities and, thereby, would assure local property taxpayers compensation for hosting transmission facilities and lines that allow gas and electric energy corporations to serve customers and conduct business in our Garden State; and

WHEREAS, the time has come to restore to local budgets the millions in property tax relief that have been annually diverted to meet State needs; now therefore be it
